The rules of disc golf are similar to ball golf, but the game is played by throwing a Frisbee-like disc from a tee pad into a wire basket. Tom Brown Park

Established in 2002, the disc golf course at the City of Tallahassee's Tom Brown Park has earned many accolades, including ranking as the top disc golf course in Florida. Nine of the 24 holes at Tom Brown Park play through wooded areas, while the remaining holes are in open areas with large oaks and pines trees on the fairways. With elevation changes and a few out-of-bounds areas sprinkled around, the course provides plenty of interest for disc golf enthusiasts of all skill levels. Tom Brown Park is a regular host of disc golf tournaments, including the popular Tallahassee Open held each April.

Jack L. McLean Jr. Park

The Jack L. McLean Jr. Park course is considered a "target" course, winding through tall pines and large oaks that will give more experienced players the challenge they crave. Like the course at Tom Brown Park, the Jack L. McLean Jr. Park course offers 24 holes and elevation changes for an exciting round of play.

Paradise Park

The newest disc golf course in the City's catalog can be found at Paradise Park, 1800 Trimble Road. This hidden gem offers 18 holes and provides a new option where players can enjoy the game and develop their skills.

CHARGE INTO FIRE SAFETY



Each October, the City of Tallahassee Fire Department and National Fire Prevention Association promote Fire Prevention Week to enhance public safety through education and awareness. This year's theme is Charge into Fire Safety: Lithium-Ion Batteries in Your Home.

Powering everyday items like mobile phones, cordless vacuums, laptops, tools and more, lithium-ion batteries may be small, but they hold a significant amount of energy. If overcharged or damaged, these batteries can overheat, start a fire or explode. Keep these tips in mind to help reduce your fire risk:



- Charge devices safely. Always use the cables that come with the product to charge. Follow the instructions from the manufacturer. Unplug your device or remove the battery when it's fully charged.
- Recycle your device or battery at a safe battery recycling location. Check with your local cell phone repair or home improvement store to learn about battery recycling options.
